It's expected that our school will be participating and lesson minded about our sports and physical fitness programmes.


Inquiries are underway for an overnight stay this year for senior students and a trip for the juniors for end of year experiences during 11 - 14 November (to be confirmed)

Event Highlights for 2024 18 December 2024


Term 4

Our years learning about the invasion of the Waikato by the British in the 1800s was presented in the school production called "The Footsteps of Our Ancestors".

Students heard and interacted with the stories told by the relatives of speakers in the video series produced by Raukawa.

The students retold their stories and chose their own characters. They wrote and told their own script and then practiced the waiata, haka and music.

They were all involved in the script and spoke their lines. While there were tragic statements made, the students were well informed about the reasons why and how events of conflict occurred.

21 Sept 2024 Term 3

Our "small school with a big heart" participated in the Tokoroa Cultural Festival. We decided to start our journey with traditional waiata, "Poi atu taku poi" composed by Erenora Taratoa of Ngāti Raukawa descent. She was a famed, beautiful and talented wāhine but jealousy by people urged her to write this waiata.

The students found that they needed to practice several times each week and followed the trail of Erenora in her travel across many places, people and events. We learned about her journey via a map and the sites she visited.

Our Te Reo Māori and pronunciation with timing had to be worked through this traditional waiata and the fluency with accuracy was the basis of our learning several long weeks. This waiata was performed at both the festival and end of year school production.

It was a huge achievement for a small school such as ours to perform in front of a large audience and we were particularly proud of our younger members who stood on stage. (see the photograph of performers)



5 June 2024

Term 2

Our school visit to Te Awamutu Museum was to learn about the History of the Waikato Wars in relation to our local iwi Ngāti Raukawa.

We specifically looked for the battles and conflict in the regions of Rangiaowhia, ŌRākau, Pukehinahina and Te Ranga as we observed the historic recording on Raukawa videos located on their website https://www.raukawa.org.nz/resources-and-publications/ called "Te Putake o te Riri - Hikoi series". They recall the "voices" of the whanau who are descendants of these close iwi and experienced hardships when the British invaded the Waikato. These events were tragic, devastating and sad for those who fought in these excursions but will be remembered by our students attempting to relive moments at the conclusion of a school production.
